

Still flying

After World War II some of the airfields in North Norfolk continued to host flying in some form or another.

Bircham Newton was opened during the first world war and it saw in the jet age with the Kestrel evaluation squadron before closing.

Little Snoring hosted a Civilian contracted unit (2CAACU) for a while until the station became too derelict, thereafter it was the home of a flying club with less demanding aircraft. At one time the club held an air show when a Hawker Sea Fury blew a good deal of asphalt from the runway. There is still flying at Little Snoring today.

The Netherlands Air Force used Langham for a while until the 2AACU moved from Little Snoring in 1952 to fly 34 aircraft until 1958.

West Raynham and Sculthorpe remained active until the 1990s, both now have Heritage museums as does Langham.
